What is the GFWC Jennie Award - The Jennie Award is the highest individual honor given by GFWC. The award is named in honor of GFWC's founder Jane Cunningham Croly, who wrote under the pen name of "Jennie June". The Jennie award gives clubs, states and regions the opportunity to identify and pay tribute to outstanding clubwomen on each level of our organization. The next Jennie will be selected in 2023 and be awarded at the 2024 GFWC Convention. It is not too early to start thinking about nominating someone for this prestigious award. Information can be found on the NJSFWC website and in future ALMANACS.

Nominees are selected based on their outstanding personal commitment to their club, community and family. By promoting the Jennie Award nominees, our communities learn about who your club is and what it is you do, as a part of NJSFWC and GFWC.

The nomination process begins with the individual clubs who nominate one of their own members for state recognition. Once a winner is chosen on the state level, this winner's name then goes onto the region. Two winners are chosen in the region and sent onto the GFWC national level. One winner from each region will be chosen by GFWC for presentation at the GFWC International convention.

GFWC Jennie Award Nominations – Don't miss out on this opportunity to honor an outstanding club woman. Each club can nominate a member of their club for the GFWC Jennie Award.

The **Kalmia Club** arranged for members to share their favorite books in a post-holiday tradition and is looking ahead to new challenges, by addressing a decline in membership through development of a Club survey.

THE ARTS AND CULTURE COMMUNITY SERVICE PROGRAM

This Chairman found two projects for your clubs to work on during the spring weather. One is from **The Haddon Fortnightly EMD**. They reported in their narrative to make "upcycled, ecofriendly, braided pet toys." They donated these toys to an Animal Adoption Center. Here are the directions to create one for your own pet or donate it in your community:

- ❖ Lay an old T-shirt flat and cut along the side seams to separate the front from the back. You can leave the sleeves attached to make your strips longer or separate them and make some shorter strips for tying the ends.
- ❖ Start cutting three-inch slits at the bottom that are roughly two to three inches wide.
- ❖ You should be able to rip the strips the rest of the way, but if the fabric is being stubborn, just keep cutting until you have a handful of long strips to work with.
- ❖ Gather the strips and tie one large basic knot.
- ❖ Separate the strips into three equal sections and braid until you have about three inches remaining, then tie off the end with another knot. Now you're ready to spend the afternoon playing with your pup.
- ❖ Feel free to use multiple T-shirts to create a more colorful or thicker toy.

The second project is sewing squares for the 2022 National Block Drive. See enclosed flyer for directions:

Grocery coupons for military personnel around the world are needed. The coupons can be up to 6 months after their expiration date. However, no "in-store" coupons can be sent. All coupons should be clipped close to their margins, as this helps with the weight of the package. Priority Mail – 14.5" x 11.5" flexible paper envelopes are requested. The PS Form 2976, available at post offices, should be filled out as well.

Coupons should be sorted into food and non-food, zip lock bags work well for this. If at all possible, it would also help the on-site coordinators to have the coupons sorted by expiration month. The most needed of coupons are:

Food: dairy, bread, canned goods, beverages, water, candy, gum, meat and frozen foods.

Non-food: baby/child care, cleaners, toiletries, make up, paper products, vitamins, medicines and pet food.

Included in this ALMANAC is a list of the current Air Force, Army, Navy & Marine military bases that will accept coupons. *Happy Clipping!*

These fun activities cover all subjects and grades; there truly is something for everyone. And, if you have your own summer adventurers at home, this list can rescue your kids from the boredom and blahs of rainy summer days. These would make great social media posts (that could be scheduled ahead of time!) to share ideas with your community to keep young minds working all summer long!

Many of these activities link to online resources. In most cases, however, the activities can be completed even by those without Internet access. The activities that do require Internet access can be printed from www.educationworld.com and distributed to students before school ends or accessed and printed by parents at most public libraries.

1. Fill in summer's special days and events on the [Education World Coloring Calendar](#) for June, July, or August. Or help children use pencils, drawing paper, and rulers to create, decorate, and fill in their own summer calendars.
2. Teach kids to cook with the step-by-step lessons and recipes at [Cooking With Kids](#). The site also includes measurement reminders, safety tips, and suggestions for involving kids in the cooking process. Or check out your local library or book store for one of the recommended [Heritage Cooking for Kids: Taste History](#) books and try out recipes from Colonial days, the Civil War, and the Lewis and Clark expedition. **Don't forget, cooking is SCIENCE!**
3. Make homemade [Bubble Solution](#) and experiment with such unique [Bubble-Blowing Tools](#) as strings, milk containers, and garbage can lids. **More SCIENCE!!**
4. Read aloud [The Paper Crane](#) by Molly Bang. Then introduce the art of paper folding by printing and following the instructions for [How to Make an Origami Crane](#). Younger children: [Try making a fish](#).
5. Go on a [Light Walk](#), an outing designed to teach kids the properties of light and facts about the sun. Bob Miller of the [Exploratorium](#) explains it all. Can't take an online tour? [Do your own image walk](#) by printing the directions and template found at the site. **Astronomy is SCIENCE!!**
6. Cool down by making [Ice Cream in a Bag](#). The simple technique produces delicious ice cream in about 5 minutes. What ice cream varieties will you and your child concoct? **SCIENCE IS EVERYWHERE!**
7. Read aloud a selection from [Candlelight Storybooks](#) or your own favorite myths or fairy tales. Discuss the stories with your child. Then invite your child to choose a favorite story, and together make a diorama depicting a pivotal moment in the tale.
8. Catch a firefly and then go online to [learn more about fireflies](#) or read a book, such as [Fireflies](#) by Sally M. Walker, to help your child learn more about them. Then invite your child to complete the Education World [Firefly Facts](#) work sheet. **Entomology is SCIENCE!**

(Firefly Facts Answers:

Fireflies are really beetles because they have four wings; true flies only have two wings.

Most fireflies like warm, humid areas.

In the United States, glowing fireflies are found east of the middle of Kansas.

Firefly larvae feed mostly on earthworms, snails, and slugs.

Scientists believe fireflies use their ability to flash as a warning signal to predators and to attract mates.

9. Print a grid of dots from [Connect the Dots](#) by [Math Cats](#) and invite your child to make an original tessellation. **MATH!**
10. Start a rock collection. [Collecting Rocks](#), a Web site by the U. S. Geological Survey, offers advice to help the novice collector gather, identify, and store neat rock specimens. The Audubon Society Pocket Guide [Familiar Rocks and Minerals North America](#) will help children identify and label the rocks and minerals they find. **Geology is SCIENCE TOO!!**

11. Plan with your child a family activity day. Decide how much money to spend, and help your child research events and activities in your area and choose an affordable activity the whole family can enjoy. Remind your child to be sure to allow enough time for the activity, and to remember to include food in the day's plan. (This online [Kids Party Checklist](#) will help.) Don't forget to bring a camera and take lots of pictures. Your child can mount and label each photo and create a family scrapbook of your special day. You might provide the questions below to help guide your child's thoughts as they plan this special day.
 - Describe the event or activity your family will attend.
 - Will everyone in the family enjoy this activity? Why do you think so?
 - What do you need to arrange ahead of time? Will you need to purchase tickets? Pack a lunch? Make reservations?
 - What supplies or materials will you need?
 - What costs will be involved?
12. Take a virtual [Campus Tour](#) of colleges and universities your high school student might be considering. Tour the schools' grounds, look at maps, view videos and photos, and request information about those institutions of higher learning. If you don't have Internet access at home, take your tour at the local library.
13. Have your child follow instructions to [Build the Best Paper Airplane in the World](#). Then ask your child to design an original paper airplane and diagram the steps for constructing it, so another family member can recreate it! **ENGINEERING and MATH!**

Partnering with your municipalities Green Team is a great way to help your community. Sustainable Jersey was developed in 2009 and today there are 463 registered municipalities. You can find out if your community has a Green Team by going to www.sustainablejersey.com and search the map of participating municipalities. The Green Teams must complete environmental actions in order to obtain the Sustainable Jersey Certification. Your clubs' environmental projects that are completed throughout the year may help your community to reach its goals. The website also offers many areas of environmental actions, Animals in the Community (both domestic and wild), Food (creating Farmers Markets, Community Gardens, and Food Pantry), Water Conservation, Health and Wellness, Arts and Culture. Many guidelines so that you and your municipality can take steps to make your community more sustainable.

The **Contemporary Club of Hasbrouck Heights** worked with their Green team by attending a spring/fall cleanup removing trash on the side of the roads. They also tabled an event at a community Environmental Education Day, displaying recyclable plastic containers and providing recycling education to their community by encouraging them to reduce, reuse, and recycle. Another club, The **Thursday Morning Club** worked with Friends of Madison Shade Trees, Inc. and their local Girl Scouts to plant 250 trees at the Madison Recreation Complex to create a buffer between the complex and a busy road. Both projects can contribute to your Green Team meeting requirements towards reaching sustainability goals.

Each community has environmental areas of concern. Actions taken by creating a dog park, pollinator or wildlife garden, tree plantings, outreach programs on recycling or water conservation, and supporting community cleanup days can all contribute to your communities' goals. Check with your local Green Team to see what actions they are taking. Have the members give a presentation at a club meeting and see where your clubs' environmental projects can contribute to creating a Sustainable New Jersey.

Amendments to the NJSFWC Bylaws will be presented at the Business Session of our Annual Convention on Sunday, April 24th and voted on at that time. The Amendments have been endorsed by the Bylaws Committee and the NJSFWC Board of Directors.

Club Presidents have received a copy of the Proposed Amendments which were enclosed in the CALL to Convention. They should give their Delegates a copy of the Proposed Amendments in order that they familiarize themselves with them in order to vote.

The Bylaws of any organization are similar to a legal corporate document and are the formally adopted rules of procedure of governance for the organization. They define the organization, its primary characteristics, how it functions, and NJSFWC's cannot be changed except "by a two-thirds vote of the voting body present and voting at the Convention." The Bylaws, in order to remain relevant, should be reviewed each year and changed as necessary. Article XVII of the NJSFWC Bylaws describes the procedure to be followed to amend the Bylaws.

Some Ideas from Your Reports:

- During the pandemic, many women were looking for something meaningful to do. LEGISLATION/RESOLUTIONS**Chris Sienkielewski**

Did you realize that GFWC have resolutions that every member may be able to lend their voice to issues that affect our nation and even around the world? And GFWC makes it very easy to access the Resolutions that are currently in Congress with the GFWC Legislative Action Center. It is a very powerful tool that helps you navigate through legislation and issues that are germane to GFWC's Resolutions. And every club member can join the Action Center.

If you haven't signed up just go to GFWC.org and look under the heading that says "WHAT WE DO". Click on "Legislation/Public Policy" and scroll down to Legislative Action Center. You can fill out the information and alerts will be sent directly to your mailbox. Once on that area, you can send an email directly to your representative. And the best part – the email is already written for you AND you can add your own message to it.

There are a few pieces of legislation that are of great interest right now on the floor of Congress:

- Eliminating Abusive and Rampant Neglect of Technologies Act (EARN IT Act, S3538): A long title to a bill that would remove immunity for social media and technology companies that knowingly facilitates the distribution of child sexual materials on their platforms. The bill updates existing federal statutes to use the term "child sexual abuse material", instead of "child pornography" since the term child pornography fails to describe the true nature of the images and undermines the seriousness of the abuse. It also establishes a commission of survivors, technology representatives, and government stakeholders to create recommendations and best practices for technology companies to respond to the global pandemic of online sexual exploitation of children.
- Protect Funding for Victims of Crime (H.R. 1652, The Victims of Crime Act –VOCA): this bill will restore and increase critical funding to the Crime Victims Fund which provides grants to state and local programs that assist victims of crime.

Your clubs can take some time to talk about these bills and even sign your members up for the GFWC Legislative Action Center at a meeting. April and May are great times to do this while enjoying the spring weather.

You can get emails when new results for any topic show up in Google Search. For example, you can get info about news, products, or mentions of your name. It is a good way to follow your club and find out if your Press Releases are being used online.

How to Create a Google Alert

- First, you must be signed into your Google account. If you have a gmail email address, you are probably already signed in. If not, sign into an existing Google account or create a new one.
- Go to Google Alerts, <https://www.google.com/alerts>.
- In the box at the top, enter a topic you want to follow, for example, your club's name.
- Click on "Show Options" and select how often you want to receive alerts, how many results you want, and the email address to send the alerts to.
- Click on "Create Alert."

Now you will get an email each time your club's name appears on the Internet.

To Change Settings or Delete an Alert

- Be sure you're signed into your Google account.
- Go back to Google Alerts, <https://www.google.com/alerts>.
- You will see your existing alerts. Just click on the trash can icon to delete an alert or the little pencil icon to edit the alert. You can also change the options.
- Make your changes.
- Click "Update Alert."

By using Google alerts, you will always know when your club name appears on the Internet.

GRANT WRITING

Grant writing takes time, persistence and plenty of research. If your club is seeking funds in lieu of fundraising during this ongoing Pandemic, Grant writing might be a good option. To do so, here are some basic tips that might be helpful.

It is more beneficial to target fewer organizations with a well-written proposal, than sending out multiple hazardous proposals to random sources. Define your needs and focus on the subject areas that meet your needs.

Before applying to any Foundation, be sure to see that **your Club project needing funding, matches the Foundations criteria** and if they require an application or letter of inquiry first, before receiving your proposal. Also, determine when the deadlines are for the submission of a proposal and follow their schedule. Be sure to confirm if the foundation requires multiple copies of your proposal and how they prefer it sent either by regular USPS mail or e-mail.

Banks and major corporations can be a good source of grant money. Research websites carefully and check for Grant guidelines. Some Foundations give a list of recent grantees which might give you some insight also. Try your own local area banks and the banks you yourself do business with. It doesn't hurt to ask your local bank representative about available Grants, this Chairman has found them to be courteous and helpful. Remember, Proposals are read by individuals who spend many hours reading and evaluating documents. Try to keep the Proposal interesting using key words and simple English. Keep your sentences short and to the point. Do not assume the reader is as familiar with the subject matter as you. Be sure there is a logical flow of information without excessive detail and repetition. Proposals can be up to 3 pages long, depending on the Foundation instructions. Lastly, you may be asked for a copy of your club's 501c3 Letter of Determination, recent budget, and a copy of your audit report, so check the Foundation's requirements carefully.
